





During 2022, we honored and celebrated our history with the founders of our organization, upon whose shoulders we stand today. RTH's history began in 1982 as Private Sector Initiative. Houstonian Robert Mosbacher, Jr. founded the organization based on his work with the Reagan White House, and the Private Sector Initiatives program, which called on volunteerism to supplement government programs for those in need.

For 40 years, Rebuilding Together Houston has been the only organization in our region to provide hundreds of families annually with life-changing home repairs. With more than 14,750 homeowners served, we have averaged one family helped per day for 40 years. Our work adds 20 years or more to the life of a home, making it safer and more resilient against disaster.

But the reality we must face is that our work has only just begun. Based on recent data, we estimate 119,000 families in Harris County are living in unsafe conditions.

Seniors, veterans, and working families with children are living in homes with hazards like leaking roofs, active mold, no hot water, dangerous electrical systems, holes in flooring – the list is long. We believe safe, healthy housing is a human right. These are hazards RTH can eliminate. We can rebuild these beloved family homes to allow seniors to age in place and pass the important asset of their home to the next generation of their family. We can honor the efforts our neighbors put forth to achieve the American dream of home ownership.

In 2023, we must move forward with more determination and hope than ever to transform the lives of more families and uplift communities.

We are incredibly grateful for the hard work and dedication of our volunteers and staff, the financial support of our donors and corporate partners, and the collaboration of the community advocates in the neighborhoods we serve. Let's do more TOGETHER.

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






Rebuilding Together Houston held a special celebration to recognize the 40th anniversary of the nonprofit organization. The program included Mayor Sylvester Turner, RT Houston Founder Rob Mosbacher, Jr., RT Houston CEO Christine Holland, and RT National CEO Caroline Blakeley, highlighting the work accomplished during the past 40 years. Presenting sponsors for the event were Reliant and Valero. On hand were Houston and RT National board members, corporate partners, staff, volunteers, and supporters.

The City of Houston, Harris County, Texas Legislature, and Governor of Texas all proclaimed May 12, 2022 as Rebuilding Together Day.

As part of the special day, volunteers from the presenting sponsors made repairs on two homes, both built 73 years earlier. Reliant helped the Ortiz family and Valero helped the Cantera family. RTH began these projects with contractors providing emergency plumbing repairs after the freeze of February 2021. Through the East End Community Revitalization Program, RT replaced their roofs, stabilized the structures, and made other critical repairs. All of this work was provided at no cost to the homeowners.

An evening celebration followed, with Milestone Sponsor AIG, and Community Sponsors Hancock Whitney, First Horizon, ExxonMobil and Houston Methodist Hospital.

Rebuilding Juntos Hispanic Heritage Month Celebration

September 20-26, 2022, we launched our 1st annual Hispanic Heritage Month event called Rebuilding Juntos. We celebrated surpassing 100 homes repaired in the East End through our Community Revitalization program. This is a goal RTH established in 2019 and we were excited about serving 3 families in the Manchester neighborhood as a part of this celebration.

The three Rebuilding Juntos houses were built in 1939, 83 years ago. RTH's work, done at no cost to the homeowners, added 20 years or more to the life of each home, making it safer and more resilient against disaster. The East End Chamber of Commerce partnered with RTH to celebrate the milestone projects with a ribbon-cutting event for the owners of the three homes.

To recognize Hispanic residents as a cornerstone of the entire Houston area, RTH and media partners Mega101-FM, Telemundo-Houston, and KPRC-TV2; and sponsors Truist Bank, Community Health Choice, Houston Dynamo and Katy Furniture, made this event a memorable celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month.

Ms. Andrea Benitez is a working mother with two boys, ages 14 and 6. RTH repaired her burst pipes after the freeze of January 2021. We saw that her roof was in bad condition and probably couldn't stand up to another



hurricane. Living on a limited income, she could not afford a new roof, so RTH provided it at no cost to her. We also stabilized the structure, brought the electrical system up to code, provided bathroom repairs, and made safety and temperature control improvements.

Weatherization Adds to Resilience

RTH's scope of work has been modified to help every eligible home qualify for weatherization through CenterPoint Energy. Interior air quality and temperature control is greatly improved in homes that have received both programs, which is important for the health of our seniors. The energy savings average 1274 kWh, over \$200 a year, a significant sum for our Very Low AMI and Extremely Low AMI families.

Addressing Summer Heat with Safe and Sound Services Program

Houston Methodist supports the RTH Safe and Sound Services program because it aligns with our ICARE values and an important segment of our mission: to address social determinants of health, disparities in healthcare access, and health inequities within Houston's minority communities.





Summer heat threatened Houston area residents more than ever in 2022. Low-income families living in aging homes with inefficient air quality and temperature equipment are most at risk for health and safety challenges. In response, RTH provides its Safe and Sound Services Program (SSSP): fire and fall prevention, interior temperature control and air quality improvement to support aging in place and overall health. Houston Methodist Hospital has sponsored SSSP since 2021.

As our region experiences more incidents of extreme weather each year, Rebuilding Together is focusing on making homes safer and more resilient against these extremes. The structural stability of a home, a

secure roof, and both air conditioning and heat are crucial elements in safeguarding the health of our neighbors.

Third Ward Community Revitalization

No neighborhood has more families at risk of losing their homes than the historic Third Ward. Low-income homeowners in Houston struggle to repair their aging homes so they can remain in their neighborhoods and eventually pass their valuable house to the next generation.

In November of 2022, Rebuilding Together Houston launched a new initiative of Community Revitalization to bring hope to families across the Third Ward, a landmark African American community since the 1870s.

Rebuilding Together Houston highlighted the home of Ms. Mary Banks. She's the widow of a legend, the "Honorary Mayor of Third Ward" Ed Banks. He earned that name for his years of community service, including a successful home repair program. It was time to pay back that service.



By them repairing it, it made it better for me, I wouldn't have to worry. I'm grateful. I can continue to live in the house and ward I love.

Additionally, safety modifications inside the home were made, including fire and fall prevention, interior temperature control, and air quality improvement. As a part of this project, Hewlett-Packard Inc (HP Inc) provided volunteers to make exterior repairs and donate HPE products to the Banks home.


